## **RECOVERY - AND ALL THAT**

For most trips "recovery" is what happens when you get home after the trip, and can be accompanied by lurid tales of adventure and maybe a cold one or three. Certainly it is an activity that is low in thinking, and is almost automatic.

But one recent Saturday 20 trip leaders learned that there is another sort of Recovery that actually requires a lot of thought and after that the action is simple and safe.

This exercise was planned after a few "Recoveries" had poor outcomes and in one case a truck write off. Duncan, our mentor, had borrowed a couple or wrecks from Pick-a-part and these were preplaced at strategic and not so easy locations for recovery.

The first task was to get the crew to Judd's farm and erect the Club Marquee. John V paced out the measurements, pegs were pegged and it all worked easily. So the lunch barbeque could proceed irrespective of the weather. That done the Club Bar-B-Q was set up for lunch.

We then split into four groups tasked with:
recovery gear inventory and familiarisation,
winching with a hi-lift jack,
recovering a car dropped of a small bank and
recovering a upside down van from a modest cliff.

The hi-lift winch needs a few short chains with hooks (remember the Howard Material Handling display at Club Night) and some pre-organised mods to the hi-lift itself. Basically you need to be able to get a rated D shackle into each end of the main bar and attached to the lifting bar, and filing or drilling the respective holes is needed.

To make the winch, one end of the jack needs a fixed non-stretch connection to the hard point (truck, tree etc) and the other end is fitted with a short chain and hook (take off the foot from the jack) and left hanging meantime. The truck being winched is connected to a length of chain (the main chain) and this is hooked by a short chain to the hi-lift lifting bar. The exercise starts with jack mechanism at the end of the jack nearest the struck truck.

Start jacking so the jack mechanism moves along the jack towards the end connected to the hard point, the arrangement pulls tight and maybe moves the truck (but more likely you just take up the slack!). Once the mechanism reaches the far end of the jack, the short hanging chain on the far end of the jack is hooked onto the main chain, and the jack is moved back a notch or two so this second (far end) chain takes up the load. The chain on the lifting bar is now slack, enabling the mechanism to be returned to the original end and the short chain on the lifting bar re-attached to the main chain by the hook. The jack mechanism is now moved up the jack to take up the strain and move the stuck truck. So it goes on!

The most important thing is to think, to always keep fingers clear of the jack and chains and take it slowly. The photo shows the arrangement.

We all moved around the exercises and completed them. The versatility and usefulness of recovery chain was clearly evident, as were the benefits of pull straight on to the desired direction of the recovery. But the main learning was that thinking is always the first thing to do, prepare a plan is second, make sure everybody knows it and who is in charge is third. Only then can the recovery itself start. Always control both ends of a vehicle (a fixed strop, a second vehicle etc) if there is any prospect of sideways slippage during the recovery.

One interesting aspect was that you need to be sure of all the facts used for decision making. At the end of the exercise this was demonstrated when one vehicle had to be towed out along the track to the gate for return to pick-a-part.

The word was "the brakes are locked and stuck on" so "it will need dragging". A short chain was used to keep the car "under control" and the journey started. So far so good. The trip went fine but after a small rise the track turned and went downhill sharply. Hmmm – the tow felt a bit lighter and hey! - what's that! - a car running alongside the tow vehicle? It eventually found a ditch and came to a stop, but clearly the wheels were free and running fine! So that information was BS.

The tow chain had slackened on the downhill section as the car wanted to go faster than the tow vehicle. This let the hook fall out and the car was loose. It kept going in a straight line whist the tow vehicle veered away on the proper track. Thus the "towed" car could and did pass the tow vehicle!

We all did the four exercises and consumed sausages for lunch, and got cleared up.

Ross decided he wanted to break a winch rope and set up with a tree and a backstop anchor truck. A small nick in the poly rope was made and the winch in proceeded. Hmmm - both vehicles started forward and the rope stayed intact. A third anchor vehicle was used with no better result. The cable did not break. So a bigger nick was created and eventually the rope did break. Ross can now cut out the frayed section and re-join the remaining good bits - remember how from the Howard Material Handling demonstration at Club Night?

So a good and learning day and the notes, when written up, will provide a good written set of learnings on best recovery practice for the Club. Thanks Duncan.

BBQ food and drinks are supplied for the kids.


A reminder that this event is for Club members and their families only.

Round 1 2016-17 series
Wainuoru hosted by Wairarapa 4x4 club

The new season of the Central Zone Club Truck Challenge (CTC) began in September with an event put on by the Wairarapa 4x4 Club at a site in Wainuioru that they have used for the last few years. It was wet during the week before the event but we prayed that we could still use the block. On the day the weather was great and the club was rewarded with an excellent turnout of competitors, over 30 vehicles and many more drivers who were sharing vehicles. We had our cadre of keen Club Truckers who do all of the rounds, National Trials competitors keeping their hand in, local club members and new to our CTC a good number of female competitors. I mentioned how lovely this was and had a boot jammed down my throat. No matter whether you are a boy or girl I think the non threatening and purely skill based hazards or driving tests make the CTC a good day out. As well as

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your skill and experience the number of cylinders attached to your skilful foot helps as does new tyres.

The calendar has filled out to an unprecedented three rounds before Christmas and another couple in the new year from February with this year's final round to be held in Taihape. Round two will be in the Taranaki on October 29 and then a month later Capital Cruiser Club will hold Round three at Burkett's Farm in Whiteman's Valley on Nov 26 (camping available on site).

Judith Hintz had her little boy David riding shotgun but I don't think she needs his advice. She had a good drive and put her Suzuki away in the same condition that it was when she started in the morning. With so many vehicles the competi-



tors were split into four groups which enabled us to get through fourteen hazards and then run side by side drag races to finish the day. Unfortunately it meant that I didn't see half of the field during the day like most of the National Trials competitors, Brent Ward, Mark Smith, Peter Grey, Kevin Galbraith and Ash Senior. But the Wairarapa National competitors had pegged out some pretty tough hazards.

The ground was so wet that even between just a few competitors a hazard could change completely, especially if the preceding person got stuck and spun holes in the course. These conditions favour people with the best and newest tyres and Alan and Shona Stone were having a good day in their Toyota Landcruiser. Hazard 8 had an easy line that only lasted for three drivers before it got chopped out. We finished the day with side by side drag races where you were paired off with a similar machine and had a timed run down both sides of the course. The left hand course required reversing to get around the corner which made it the slower track while the right hand track provided some spectacular jumps as people spun around to get back.

Short wheel base Nissan Patrols were a popular vehicle with variants from mild to wild, full body to ute conversion. Peter Robinson entered in the new Class 4 with his Patrol using the event to train for an upcoming winch challenge. Neil Blackie, our current president runs a very interesting Land Rover. The Series 3 soft top isn't what it appears to be, having a petrol V8 engine and a shortened Range Rover chassis to give the vehicle coil springs and disc brakes. Its current evolution has Nissan axles for increased beefiness. Pajeros and Wranglers are also popular choices but at the end of the day Ross Gregory came third driving his very basic Jeep showing that skill is all that is required.



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# Irresponsible 4WD activity puts access in doubt

Popular visitor sites in Southland are being destroyed because of inconsiderate four-wheel drive users, forcing DOC to rethink access rights to some areas.

Date: 18 November 2016

Over the past twelve months, significant parts of the Mavora Lakes and Borland areas have been damaged by vehicles. Instances of rubbish-tipping are also on the rise.

Grant Tremain, DOC Principal Ranger, Recreation/Historic (Fiordland District) said that while 4WD activity is allowed on certain areas of conservation land, these are restricted to tracks built and maintained for that purpose:

"Reckless and thoughtless four-wheel driving is causing significant damage to the landscape. There is a code of conduct for four-wheel driving, designed for the long-term sustainability of the activity, and the environment."

"If this wilful destruction of the environment persists, we may have to review vehicle access to certain areas of conservation land. This is a shame as there are many responsible four-wheel drive users in New Zealand who would never consider causing this kind of damage," Grant Tremain said.

Four-wheel drivers are required to avoid sensitive areas, including alpine landscapes, swamps, waterways, sand dunes and river beds easily damaged by vehicles. Vehicles are also required to stay on tracks, and avoid widening them.

Bill Jarvie, Fish & Game Officer (Te Anau) said that he was very concerned about recent reports of 4WD activity at Mayora Lakes Conservation Park:

"Vehicles have been seen racing each other along the lakeside road, and there is clear evidence of destructive offroading, and associated littering with bottles. Apart from the environmental impact this causes, this kind of activity puts the safety of legitimate park users at risk."

"The Mavora Lakes area is popular with families, locals and overseas visitors whether they be camping, tramping, fishing or horse-riding," Bill Jarvie said.

Those embarking on four-wheel driving are required to read and abide by the 4WD Care Code.

# Four wheel drive care code

Follow the code of conduct for the long-term sustainability of the activity and the environment.

Follow the code of conduct to protect the environment and for the long-term sustainability of off-road driving.

- Avoid sensitive areas. Alpine landscapes, swamps, waterways, sand dunes and river beds are easily damaged by vehicles.
- · Abide by the laws and regulations covering all vehicles and drivers.
- · Stay on roads. Avoid widening them.
- · Keep the environment clean. Take all your rubbish with you.
- · Respect wildlife, look but don't disturb. Keep your distance.
- · Find out if a permit is required for access. If your trip crosses private land obtain permission.
- Leave gates as you find them.
- Always thoroughly clean your vehicle before and after trips to minimise spreading weeds and diseases.
- · Respect the right of others for quiet enjoyment. Avoid noisy driving. Give way to walkers, cyclists, horse riders
- · Be prepared for the unexpected. Drive at a speed which will allow you to stop if a hazard arises.
- · If winching is necessary, use another vehicle. If you must use a tree, use webbing or padding to prevent damage to the tree.
- · Cross waterways with care. Use designated crossings where possible.

## **CLUB RADIO CALL SIGNS**

The Club uses a series of radio call signs in the Kxxx series to meet our licence requirements. Once you get on a trip you soon know what call sign is tail end charlie etc for the day. But basically if you don't yet have a Call Sign you are not authorised to use the Club radio licence.

Call signs are available to financial members on request to database@ccvc.org.nz

So if you have purchased a suitable radio for CCVC use, make sure you get a call sign allocated.

## **Trip Categories**

The following trip category definitions, plus any *additional* requirements specified on individual Trip Information Sheets, will be enforced, for safety reasons. Trip Leaders will turn away vehicles or drivers that do not comply. The vehicle and driver requirements given here are a summary of the full requirements listed on the club website. Please refer to www.ccvc.org.nz for a definitive list of requirements.

For all Categories: All open or soft-top vehicles must have a roll bar or roll cage.

All Categories **other than Family 4X4** are for members only. Prospective members and visitors are welcome if they can demonstrate to the Trip Leader they are members of another club and have adequate experience.

#### Family 4X4:

**Description:** Family trip. These trips will be straightforward and will usually include some degree of guidance in driving techniques as necessary.

**Drivers:** Particularly suited to family outings and drivers new to off-road driving, this category is also open to anybody who enjoys this style of trip.

**Members:** Anybody is welcome, especially prospective new members.

**Vehicles:** An important objective is minimal challenge and minimal risk to vehicles. Club safety equipment is mandatory for club members; it is not mandatory for non-members although it is recommended for vehicles once their drivers have participated in one or two trips. All open or soft-top vehicles must have a roll bar or roll cage.

### Shiny 4x4:

**Description:** More difficult family trips, for shiny wagons and drivers with some experience who want more challenge and don't mind minor bush marks etc on their vehicles.

**Drivers:** Must have some experience, particularly important are experience in stropping, failed hill climbs, steep descents and sidelings. Club members must have completed CCVC Driver Training and participated in at least 2 Family 4X4 trips <u>after</u> becoming a member.

**Vehicles:** Vehicles must have mud tyres, tow hooks and all the required equipment per the club's document "Vehicle Safety & Equipment Inspections". This applies to all vehicles on the trip.

## Club 4x4:

**Description:** Challenging trips, for experienced drivers. There will be steep and challenging terrain, modestly deep water and mud, likelihood of bush marks.

**Drivers:** Must have experience beyond that required for Shiny 4x4 trips, including water crossings and vehicle recovery. Club members must have participated in at least 2 Shiny 4X4 trips.

**Vehicles:** Must have mud tyres, tow hooks and all the required equipment per the club's document "Vehicle Safety & Equipment Inspections". This applies to all vehicles on the trip. Accessories such as high-lift jacks, externally mounted spare tyre, bush bars and multiple jacking points are of advantage. Winches are often particularly useful. Generally a short wheelbase vehicle is better suited for the tight tracks.

## **Hard Yakka:**

**Description:** Difficult trips with very challenging terrain and surfaces, where winching, digging, and vehicle damage are all a possibility!

**Drivers:** Experienced drivers only, must have approval of Trip Leader. Club members must have participated in at least 3 Club 4X4 trips.

**Vehicles:** As per the Club 4x4 category. In addition, a roll-bar or roll-cage is recommended for all vehicles on Hard Yakka trips. Often a winch is mandatory on a Hard Yakka trip; this will be specified on the Trip Information Sheet
