
It was great to see Capital Kiwi being recognised for their work. Cub member, Barry, was there to be part of the awards.

OHINEWAIRUA STATION - 13th - 17th July 2023

First Day.

We had been invited to join Wellington CCVC on a trip over Matariki weekend. Finished work early arvo. Off to meet Dave & Lee, Colin & Kim at Fernhill at 3pm. We were running late arriving at 3.10pm but no Colin & Kim. They were even later than usual!! All good and on our merry way over the Napier-Taihape road, it's been a long time since we travelled this part of the country. Dave & Lee had their Suzuki on a trailer as did Colin & Kim. Pleasant drive, but sad to see the devastation from Cyclone Gabrielle along the way, a real eye opener to us all.

Past some big Hawkes Bay stations such as Ngamahanga, Ngamatea, Otupae and a stop at Robson's Lodge at Kuripapango that was surrounded by slash build up, then eventually Ohinewairua, our destination. A massive 7500 hectares of farmland, a well developed breeding and finishing farming business that is running sheep, beef and deer.

Wellington club members had already arrived. Made our way to the shearer's quarters for our sleeping accommodation. OMG, this is not what one had envisaged. Cluster flies on ceiling, mattresses less desirable, holes in the floor – gee mice would love that! Lee was keen to go home and bring back their campervan. After much discussion we sorted ourselves out, beds made and off to meet with others beside the lovely glowing fire. Roast meal went down a treat, along with the desserts thanks to John and the team from the Wellington club. Time to go back to the Hilton, ready for Day 2.

Next day after a reasonable nights sleep although it was tainted with heavy snoring! Late start and a chilly one. Big spots of rain. Left camp after a debrief at nine thirty. After first gate it was really boggy. Photo shoot of all fifteen vehicles. Off we go, very slippery and one vehicle had window wiper problems, so was held up for fifteen minutes. Brent had to snatch strap one vehicle up a greasy track, one old prado towing a fairly new one. We went from a paddock of Angus bulls to a paddock of horses then deer then back to horses. Through more boggy ground, due to cattle grazing, slipping and sliding not good. Some got stuck and needed towing but most managed to turn around and make their own way out. We decided to reverse through gate, made it. Spotted a hare hiding amongst the thistles. Steep hill climb, Colin and Kim, Dave and Lee had less hassles getting up, but for our truck it was too much for the old girl! Got towed out, mud everywhere from the bonnet to the roof. Next challenge going through the water crossing with a very slippery exit. Followed a slippery track and Brent said we would follow everyone else but we bounced to the right and made our own track while keeping the momentum going.

Left farm track onto main road and back to our accommodation for lunch. Off again at 1pm ready for an arvo 4X4ing! Narrow track with a large naily rock poking out inside a corner, steep decent if it didn't go right. Most of us scrapped our running boards & sills. Next up a steep hill. Colin & Kim didn't make it so we took the chicken track. Lots of towing happening, slipping and sliding but all good fun.

Wondered why we always had sticky hands when using our hand sanitiser only to realise that Mr B had put hand wash in the vehicle, I knew he should've gone to Specsavers!

Carried on travelling up to a ridge which overlooked a very large deep valley and it was blowing a gale. Spectacular view. The earthquake from the Taupo eruption caused this lake to empty itself which formed the Rangitikei river catchment and made it what it is today. Mother Nature had some big plans for this area! Back to base camp where local parents provided us with a lovely meal as a fundraiser for Moawhango school. Time to reflect on the days activities and to hear the kids (Carter and Jack from Wgtn club) thoughts about it too.

Day 3

Left @ 9:15am, not as cold this morning, a good nights sleep and snoring kept to a minimum. Off onto another farm track through the bottom of a valley, spectacular vistas with a clear and beautiful bush fed Aorangi river at the bottom. In front is army land that backs onto Waiouru. John has a wealth of knowledge and was telling me that the river is all part of the Horizon Catchment area that stretches from Whanganui to Hawkes Bay, except Whangamomona who are independent of Horizon. Would normally get resource consent to travel over this property, but as we are following farm tracks only it wasn't required.

Would be a great spot to camp over summertime, if only. Carrying on further we were first up a 'shiney' track only to come to a halt and skidded backwards. Up more steep inclines, which were challenging but a lot of fun. It was a shame it was too cloudy to see Mt Ruapehu.

Said goodbye to Colin & Kim, as they headed back to Hawkes Bay for a 21st. Colin was to come back tomorrow with Jan to join the 4X4 convoy. Meantime we carried on down to the NZ Defence boundary fence into a tight corner and more challenges ahead for ones that choose a different path up through the bush line. I chose to walk, felt a bit safer and it was nice to embrace the chance to have a walk. Back to base for the evening, self catering tonight and lots of chatter and laughs around the fire with a lovely group of fellow 4x4 enthusiasts.

Day 4

Colin & Jan turned up ready @ 8:20am ready for Jan's first day of the runs. Bit blowey but the sun is shining. Through the first gate and young Carter is ready and waiting for the round of lollies for being gate monitor. Lee was on next gate, bugger run out of lollies! Cruised up more steep hills, embracing oneself. Large rolling hills and travelling on many a ridge line. CAPITAL KIWI UPDATE



Kia ora

An update on the mission for kiwi to whakakāinga anō (make their homes again) in the wild on Wellington's hills:

- Fourteen of the 63 birds (released in November and May) are being monitored weekly via transmitters. They are doing well: holding or putting on weight, with some now pairing up. Kiwi calls are being reported heard on the western edge of the city.
 - 2. Last week the project was the <u>Supreme Award-winner at the 2023 Wellington Airport Regional</u> <u>Community Awards</u>. The citation from The Mayor read:
 - "Capital Kiwi are so deserving of this Supreme Award, having really captured the heart of the nation and provided Wellingtonians with a sense of ownership and pride in the unprecedented success of this world-leading project."
 - 3. On Sunday night the project was featured in a 'Country Calendar' episode on Terawhiti Station. It included the May welcoming of the kiwi at Mākara Village Hall by iwi and locals, and their release beneath the mānuka on Terawhiti. Watch on TVNZ+.

CCVC TRIP PLANNING SURVEY - RESULTS

Overview:

The survey was sent to 256 members via email and of those 113 completed the survey which, by survey standards, is a very pleasing result at 44%. This well exceeds the "good" survey result average of between 5% to 30% (an "excellent" response is 50% and higher)

Generally it appears that the trips we currently run are meeting our members requirements although there is a strong demand for "Shiny 4x4" trips as members wish to move to the harder trip categories and while this demand is currently being met we do need more active trip leaders to ease the burden on the current trip leaders.

Many members requested more Away trips as well as Training and Social (eg BBQ) trips.

TRIP ATTENDANCE

Of the respondents, 85% had attended a trip in 2023 and 35% had attended more than 5 trips already in 2023 with the majority stating that their last trip was a "Family Shiny" or a "Shiny 4x4".

REASONS FOR NOT ATTENDING TRIPS.

The main reasons stated for not attending trips were; having other commitments (family etc), thought trips too repetitive and were no longer interested in the current destinations or their vehicles had been off road for an extended period.

FUTURE TRIPS

There was a good spread of trip types that members would like to see more of, remembering that respondents could choose more than one category when answering this question.

The biggest requested trip category was Shiny 4x4 followed by "Family Shiny". There was also a noticeable request for "Hard Yakka" trips with Social, Community Focused, Training (various sorts) and Away Trips in high demand.

AWAY TRIPS (NEW ZEALAND)

A demand for more "Away" trips was indicated with 60% of respondents saying they would attend "Away" trips if offered.

INTERNATIONAL TRIPS:

31% of respondents stated they would be interested in International Club Trips with Australia, the Americas and Africa topping the list.

Land Access:

A small number of members indicated they may have access to land the club can use and those members are encouraged to pass this on to Trip Leaders / Land Access etc so the club can investigate further.

Trip Leaders:

20 Members indicated that they are interested in becoming Trip Leaders and if you are one of them you are encouraged to contact the Club Captain (Frank Alan) and discuss this with him and to start the process. (Remember we don't know who you are as this was an "anonymous survey").

Where to from here?

The detailed results of the survey have been forwarded to the Committee for discussion and will be distributed to the Trip Leaders to assist in future trip planning.

Some suggestions are already being acted upon so look out for some "different" trips in the near future to hopefully encourage members to become more engaged with the club.


A big "Thank you" to all members who completed the survey. Your feedback has been most helpful .

UPCOMING NATIONAL EVENTS

Friday 19th Jan - Monday 22nd Jan 2024 MANAWATU 4WD CLUB CHARITY SAFARI 2024

Hosted by the Manawatu 4WD Club over Wellington Anniversary weekend.

Tag a long trip suitable for all 4wd vehicles with a transfer box. We will once again be taking on the steep spectacular tracks around Ngamatapouri in the upper reaches of the Waitotara valley (the longest no exit road in New Zealand). Camping once again will be on the sports field.

More details will come in due course, but for now keep the weekend free and we will update as details come to hand.

TRIP CATEGORIES

Please make yourself familiar with the trip categories and ensure both you and your vehicle are capable of the trip you are going on.

Cross Country Vehicle Club Wellington Incorporated (CCVC or Club) organises and runs 4WD trips and events that cover terrain of various degrees of difficulty. Club members and visitors that participate have differing levels of off-road driving skills and experience and their vehicles have differing degrees of off-road capability.

As a guide to participants, the level of difficulty of each trip is identified in advance as falling into one or more of the pre-defined Trip Categories. The Trip Categories are defined as:

Touring Class Travelling on back country roads accessible to the General Public. Limited "off road" travel may occur but only where appropriate to vehicles on the trip;

Family Shiny Introductory level "off road" trip;

Shiny 4x4 More challenging "off road" trip;

Club 4x4 Specialist vehicles and equipment required, also additional driver skills;

Hard Yakka The most difficult terrain, requiring significant driver and vehicle capability.

Safety issues can arise if drivers have inappropriate skills, experience or vehicle capability for any given trip.

CCVC has defined the guidelines set out in this document, describing driver skills and experience prerequisites for participation in club trips and events in order to optimise safety to the greatest extent possible and practicable.

Membership of CCVC

To become a member of CCVC a driver must attend three (3) trips of either the "Touring Class" or "Family Shiny" category trip.

Once these trips have been completed and the "Application for Membership" submitted, the prospective new member's application will be considered through the Club's new member approval process.

Advancing through the trip categories

In order to advance to a "harder" trip category, members are expected to have participated in a minimum of two (2) trips in the previous category. Members are to advise the Trip Leader when they attend their first trip of the next category up.

Members will be required to have attended a club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

The member must also be judged as being capable to participate in this level of trip by the Trip Leader.

A Trip Leader has the absolute right to exclude a member from a trip if the they believe that the trip is beyond the capability of either the member and/or their vehicle and that participation in the trip has the potential to place the member, their vehicle or other persons participating in the trip in any form of danger due to the Member and/or their vehicles unsuitability.

The Trip Leaders decision on the day is final and can only be contested via the clubs "Complaints Process" as set out in item 51 of the Clubs Rules (Constitution).

To participate in any trip other than "Touring Class" members vehicles must have a current CCVC Vehicle inspection sticker.

Note: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

Club members are using it as a way to share photos of trips—I know not everyone uses Facebook but if you do and haven't managed to sign up it's a good way to see what other members are up to.

CLUB ASSETS

The Club has purchased various assets over the years, mainly for use on Club events or to facilitate the smooth running of the Club. At the discretion of the Committee these assets may be borrowed by Club members for non-club purposes. WANT TO PLAY A BIGGER PART IN THE CLUB?

Think of joining the committee or training to become a trip leader. If you think you would like to have a more of a role in the club speak to one of the committee members to see how you can help.







TRAINING:

Training takes place on every trip and Trip Leaders will try to provide support and instruction (as appropriate) to prospective and new members attending each trip.

This may be done either by the trip leader or by having an experienced Club Member take the individual "under their wing" (so to speak) for the period of the trip.

Training events for specific aspects of 4WD'ing will be organised by the Club from time to time.

As from the effective date of this document, attendance at a Club driver training event will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the club.

Members will be required to have attended a Club training event, as determined by the Club from time to time, prior to being able to participate in any trip with a category of "Shiny 4x4" or above.

VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

Safety is paramount in everything the club does and to this end the Club has a vehicle inspection regime where members vehicles are inspected by appointed CCVC Vehicle Inspectors to ensure that the vehicles meet the specific requirements as set out in the various Club documents (e.g. CCVC-SAFETY-0002 Minimum Standards for Tow Hook Mounting).

A vehicle inspection sticker is valid for two (2) years from the date of issue. CCVC requires that all CCVC Members vehicles participating in any trip category other than Touring Class trips have a current CCVC Vehicle Inspection sticker. Members vehicles not having a current sticker displayed cannot participate in trips/events.

The Trip Leader/Event Organiser has no discretion in this regard except: Exemption to the Inspection Sticker rule above may be given for trips where the nature of the trip involves minimal or no off road driving and a CCVC certified vehicle is not really required in order to participate in the trip (e.g. Trips/events that have been given a "Shiny 4x4" category in order to exclude non members).

As from the effective date of this document, having a vehicle inspected and obtaining a vehicle inspection sticker for the vehicle will no longer be a prerequisite to joining the Club. Members and prospective members can judge for themselves which trips are appropriate for them however the Trip Leader has the final say as to whether a person or vehicle can participate in any trip or event.

It is recommended that novices on Family Shiny trips and Members new to the Shiny 4x4 category make themselves known to the Trip Leader so they can be allocated a "buddy" to guide and assist them during the trip.
